#### Policy Roundtable on Transforming Odisha's Agri-food Systems

#### Theme-Building partnership for agri-food transformation in Odisha for doubling farmers' income

#### Background

The paradoxical nature of Odisha with rapid progress on development indicators but lagging agricultural transformation, with moderate rise in farm incomes, and subpar resilience in agriculture beckons new thinking. There is a need for a new strategy for farmer welfare and inclusive development. Odisha's growth story presents both robust economic growth with a steady rise in consumption and investment on the one hand but on the other, the income of farmers from crop production has been less than half of the national average. Further, because of climate-related factors, while nationally in India 41% of farmers have on average experienced crop loss, it is over 71% for Odisha farmers. Like the Government of India (GoI), the Government of Odisha (GoO) has thus also embarked on the ambitious target of doubling farmers' income (DFI).

The poor in rural areas of Odisha who depend on agriculture cultivate extremely small parcels of land have low yields, face climate risks, and high transaction costs to access information, technology, and markets. There are key challenges faced by smallholders in Odisha. In the past, several efforts have been initiated to improve the livelihood of the poor and smallholders, but the outcomes leave the possibility of further improvement.

To overcome emerging and complex challenges, it is necessary to bring key actors and stakeholders together to jointly develop and implement policies and programs. Therefore, the formal partnership of key actors and stakeholders is needed to play an important role in transforming agriculture and improving outcomes for farmers as GoO mainstreams doubling farmer income (DFI) as its core strategy.

GoO and International Food Policy Research Institute (IFPRI) signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) recently for partnership for collaborative research and capacity strengthening activities for meeting the goals of farm income growth at the required levels and for dealing with shocks to preserve farmer welfare. The objectives of the proposed partnership with GoO, inter alia, is to develop a network of key stakeholders, especially professionals, policymakers, private sector, and civil society organizations in prioritizing challenges and approaches and to harness opportunities of faster diffusion of sustainable technologies, practices, and innovative policies for smallholders' welfare.





#### Objectives:

As a part of the MoU, the Department of Agriculture and Farmers' Empowerment in collaboration with IFPRI will organize a policy roundtable in Bhubaneswar, on October 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup>, 2022, on issues related to building a resilient food system in the state for raising farmers' income. The objective is twofold:

1. To brainstorm and deliberate on how we can strengthen the partnership on agri-food transformation in the state to work towards the objective of sustainably raising farmers' income. Many development partners including donors, technical support organizations, international and local NGOs, and multilateral agencies working at the state and/or district level support GoO efforts on DFI. Through this roundtable, it will be an endeavor to prevent overlap of efforts and optimize on different lines of work by different organizations, private sectors and institutions. Through information sharing, collaborative engagement, with targeted geographic and strategic planning, the goal is to develop a shared strategy to ensure evidence-based policies. The objective is to deliver the best results for raising farmers' income. Towards this, the policy roundtable aims to strengthen coordination and collaboration in support of GoO efforts, with convergence across different agencies and implementers.

Several stakeholders such as BMGF, IRRI, ICARDA, ICRISAT, WFP, CIP, Odisha Integrated Irrigated Program for Climate Resilient Agriculture (OIIPCRA), ICAR-NRRI, ICAR-CIBA, ICAR-CIWA, IWMI, MPEDA, Animal Husbandry, Oil Palm Companies, World Bank - Governance, Development and Impact (GDI) and others are working to implement a shared strategy for improving farmers' income in the state. The policy roundtable is a reflection of the felt need to learn more about what the various development partners are working on and if there are further opportunities for strengthening collaboration.

2. Further, as part of the roundtable, the Department will also organize a session with IFPRI and IWMI (two CGIAR organizations active in state) dedicated to optimal water use systems and rationalized policies towards this goal. Policies, programs, investments, and innovations aimed at state achieving the goal of expanding access to affordable and sustainable irrigation while addressing the issues of sub optimal returns to irrigation. Notably, 16 of the 30 districts in Odisha are among the most irrigation-deprived districts of India with the highest proportion of unirrigated holdings. Less than 35% of the cultivable area is irrigated in 198 of the 314 blocks of the state. Government of Odisha has decided to provide irrigation to at least 35% of the land in every block of the state. Water use optimization and efficiency are core needs of raising and stabilizing farm incomes in Odisha.

Expanding access to affordable irrigation in Odisha is both a water and an energy challenge. Since 1990, almost all the new irrigated area added in India has been as a result of the expansion of pump irrigation – in which access to energy plays a pivotal role. Electricity use for irrigation in Odisha has increased from 158 million units in 2011-12 to 806 million units in 2021-22–a fivefold increase in just 10 years. Going forward, some key questions remain - What kind of power supply regime and pricing policies can facilitate equitable and sustainable irrigation expansion?





As part of the component of roundtable dedicated to access to water and water use efficiency, robust discussion is planned for solar energy. Over the last decade, India has seen massive growth in the deployment of solar energy. India is home to more than 93% of the world's renewable energy generation capacity deployed for use in agriculture (IRENA 2021). Solar irrigation pumps had grown from a handful in 2010 to more than 300,000 by 2020. Both the Department of Agriculture and the Odisha Renewable Energy Development Authority (OREDA) are working together to promote the use of solar pumps for irrigation.

Another key area of priority is the adoption of micro irrigation systems that can lead to more efficient use of water and energy for irrigation and help farmers bring more land under high-value cultivation in the winter and summer seasons. Its adoption, however, has been below potential in Odisha despite substantial capital subsidies offered by the state government. What can be learnt from the experience of micro irrigation promotion in other states

These three themes will be discussed in the Policy Dialogue on 'Water and Energy Policies for Food System Transformation in Odisha' on 20<sup>th</sup> October 2022. Several stakeholders such as farmers, entrepreneurs, civil society organizations, donors, financial institutions, and senior state officials from the Departments of Agriculture; Energy; Water Resources, and OREDA will attend this policy dialogue. Discussions will be based on empirical policy research in Odisha, but also on the experience of policy formulation and implementation elsewhere. Bold ideas and innovative business models will be discussed.

The policy roundtable is planned for October 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> at Crystal Hall, Mayfair Convention Bhubaneswar, Mayfair Road, Near Tarini Siddheswara Temple, 8 B, Jaydev Vihar, Bhubaneswar, Odisha 751013, for one and half days.
